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## Informative Writing: The Truth About Columbus

#### Choice A:

Write a letter to our Social Studies textbook company to inform them of what they left out about Columbus.

#### Choice B:

Write a newspaper article that we can publish for a 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> grade class. Inform them of important and accurate information about Columbus.

### Either choice must include:

- I. And introduction paragraph in which you:
  - Get your reader's attention and introduce the topic
  - Summarize what the textbook says about Columbus (Choice A)
  - Explain who Columbus was (Choice B)
  - Introduce that there are multiple perspectives regarding Columbus

II. At least two body paragraphs about what happened and what he did, according to a variety of sources.

- You must cite your sources in parentheses after a major piece of information.
- *Example*: Columbus made a second expedition in 1493, but there were many problems this time (Everett and Reid).

III. A conclusion paragraph explaining who he was overall and your main point (what the textbook should say, or what 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> graders should know).

IV. A bibliography, or list of the sources you used, including title and author.

#### Writing Expectations:

At least 4 paragraphs long, with all components included.

Interesting introduction that grabs attention and introduces the topic without giving away too many details.

First body paragraph makes a strong point and shares historical information, supported by facts and details from research.

Second body paragraph makes a new strong point and shares historical information, supported by facts and details from research.

Conclusion paragraph summarizes the topic without repeating the same ideas.

# Style and Conventions:

Consistently uses complete sentences (no fragments or run-ons).

Uses a variety of sentence lengths and vivid, interesting word choice.

All sources are cited in parentheses as explained in class.

Commonly misused words, like there/their/they're, are used correctly.

Subjects and verbs agree.

Verb tense is consistent and correct throughout the writing.

Plurals and possessives are used correctly.
